PMI Press Book Launch



Meet Your Committee ... No. 1.

Last year our series of special articles in the newsletter focused on the 140 High Street building. This year we shift our emphasis from the past to the present and from bricks and mortar to people as we shine a light on our committee members. Each newsletter this year will contain a profile of a member of the committee in alphabetical order.

Alison Boundy

My name is Alison Boundy, and my husband and I and our family have lived in Prahran since 1969. I have a great interest in Prahran as my paternal grandfather, Charles Thompson White Morris, was the Building Inspector for the City of Prahran, and my father's family lived in East Prahran for many years.

My great, great grandmother was born in Prahran in 1851!!! I am very proud to have in my possession a copy of Cooper's The History of Prahran 1836-1924 which is inscribed as follows: 'Presented to Mrs Elizabeth Peebles, the oldest lady Pioneer (born in Prahran 1851) present at the Annual General Meeting of the Prahran Pioneers' Association 2nd March, 1925. J.C. Pickford, Mayor.'

Both my husband and I qualify as members of the Port Phillip Pioneers Group as our ancestors arrived in Port Phillip prior to Separation in 1851.

My main interest now that I am retired is genealogy and family history. I also subscribe to the Australian Ballet, and love listening to classical music. Reading is my passion, and I have a very large personal library.

As a natural follow-on from my love of reading, I trained as a teacher at Toorak Teachers' College in 1957 and 1958, then as a teacher-librarian (primary) at Melbourne Teachers' College in 1959. During my career I taught at Coburg West and Huntingdale Primary Schools, Lauriston and St. Michael's Grammar School in St. Kilda. I also lectured to the students doing the Trained Teacher Librarian's Certificate at the then Melbourne Teachers' College.

As a librarian I was aware of the PMI Library before we lived in Prahran, and we joined in 1991. In particular, the local history collection has been very useful in our search for information about the areas in which our families lived.

I was elected to the Committee in 2003, and re-elected in 2005. I chose to accept nomination as I felt that my knowledge of libraries and of genealogy, gained from being a member of the Genealogical Society of Victoria, could be of use to the Committee and perhaps to subcribers to the library.

No Shops in Acland Street has taken some time to reach this stage, as you will see from the following feature article which contains comments from the compiler, the author and the publisher ...

Hélène Jacoby Swieca (author):

Over the years I was a patient at the Cabrini Hospital and used to tell stories to my doctor there and he was very adamant that I should write my story. I did begin to do this, but I couldn't keep it up because of my failing eyesight.

I met Cecily in Sydney many years ago. Her grandmother Alice and my mother Ethel were sisters. Cecily and I got along very well and after I moved to Melbourne Cecily would visit me regularly. When Cecily suggested she write my story I did not have to think about it at all - I was pleased.

Cecily and her husband live in NSW these days, so every time she interviewed me, she would have to travel down to Melbourne to see me. Then as parts of the book were completed she would travel down to meet with me again.

I didn't find the interview process difficult because I have an excellent memory, and in my career I was very used to being interviewed. I don't think it particularly mattered that it was a family member doing this project, what is most important is to be able to tell your story to someone with whom you have a rapport. I would like to thank everyone involved with the book, especially PMI Press and Frank Van Straten.

SPECIAL ARTICLE

Street: the Story of a Book . . .

Cecily Parris (transcriber, compiler & editor):

I was motivated to take on such a large project and to see it through to the end because I have always admired Hélène's ability to tell a good story about her life and experiences. She was always so willing to tell me as much as she could remember that I was inspired to go to the end.

I started the ball rolling by asking Hélène a few basic questions about her earliest memories, but I found that she didn't need much prompting. Hélène's very early memories were the starting point of the book also.

I ended up with about eight hours worth of recorded interviews, which took me several months to transcribe to my satisfaction. To organise the material into a coherent story, I treated all the material from a chronological point of view. I then had to edit a lot of the transcribed material, as Hélène remembered further along things she had previously forgotten to mention about an earlier episode in her life.

I would advise anyone considering such a project to be patient, because it is definitely worth it. It is also worthwhile to spend the time researching as much as you can to give historical context to the person's memories. (hristine Worthington (Administrator, PM1 Press):

This was our second publication, but it represented a number of important firsts for Prahran Mechanics' Institute Press.

No Shops in Acland Street is our first publication to be laid out and typeset using Adobe InDesign software, for which I attended a course at Swinburne University in 2005. This is also our first publication to be installed on Booksurge, a worldwide print-on-demand system.

Publications registered and installed on the Booksurge system never go out of print and are available globally through the Amazon and Booksurge online bookstores. This is an inexpensive option for authors of books with local interest who have no idea of whether they should get 50 or 1,000 books printed.

Cecily was referred to us by PMI member Ron Cameron who had heard about PMI Press in our newsletter. In many ways this was an ideal project for us to take on next because it was reasonably sized, contained a significant amount of Victorian history, and is a colourful story developed from an oral history - one of the types of projects that PMI Press aims to encourage and support.

Thank goodness for email and pdf files because with Cecily in NSW, most of our project communication occurred this way. Apart from our initial meeting, Cecily travelled to Melbourne at a later stage of the project and over two days we sorted through Hélène's scrapbooks which were full of theatre programmes, photographs and press clippings, and selected items for inclusion and scanned them. At this time we were able to decide on possible pictures for the book cover.

For this project I worked on almost every aspect of the book files including layout and book cover design in consultation with Cecily and Hélène. I also created a small name index. A map of the St Kilda area landmarks


mentioned in the book was provided by Ron, and apart from all her work on the text, Cecily has added a preface and an appendix containing a summary of Hélène's career and other tidbits. Frank Van Straten has provided the Foreword and will launch the book.

I would particulary like to thank Michael Blair from Booksurge for

his patience, guidance and assistance throughout.
