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Grants Good News for PMI!

Good News for Prahran Campus!


You may have seen the recent announcement that Swinburne will sell the Prahran Campus to NMIT (Northern Metropolitan Institute of TAFE).

Jennie has been answering phone and desk enquiries, processing loans, covering and repairing books, and sorting our bulging vertical files by consolitating material by municipality.

Monthly Books for Sale

We've been receiving a great response to our monthly 'Books for Sale' lists.

The sales contain duplicate materials from the collection, as we only keep second copies of particular types of items. Additionally, many duplicate items from the Watson donation in 2007 are now being checked to the shelves so that old and worn copies can be replaced.

The remainders will continue to appear in the monthly book sales, as we wish to clear all surplus stock before we move next year.

We get so many responses to the list that often the popular books get snapped up early - but here are a few tips to help increase your chances of getting the items you want:

2. 'Like' the PMI on Facebook, and you'll receive a link to the list even earlier than the email list 3. As soon as you receive the list, copy and paste the items you'd like into an email and send it to ursula@pmi.net.au as quick as you can (as only emailed orders are processed on the first day of the sale). After the first day of the sale, when all the initial orders have been processed, members are welcome to browse and select from the remaining items on the book sale shelves.

4. Be sure to pick up your items from the library within two weeks, otherwise they return to the 'for sale' shelf.

If you are browsing the books for sale shelf, you may also wish to check the several piles of surplus journals and magazines for sale at only 20c each.

VOLUNTEERS PIEWS

So far this year 19 volunteers have contributed 596.5 hours work in the library, delivered 200 PMI pamphlets and created six book indexes.

All the Whitehorse Manningham Libraries donations from last year have now been added to the catalogue and are awaiting covering by the book care volunteers. Much of this material will remain in stacks until we move.

Volunteers have been assisting library student Jennie with sorting through our vertical file material, consolidating place files into their municipalites and identifying booklets needing their own entries in the catalogue.

Volunteers with library experience continue to check back through our old accession register - checking items on the Libraries Australia (Trove libraries) database to ensure all our holdings are correctly listed and making notes on any anomalies they find. This is a huge job, but with the kind assisance of volunteers steady progress in being made. We're fortunate to have a number of diploma, batchelor, garduate diploma and masters students in our register for jobs like this.

This is yet another example of a 'backburner' project which, despite it's importance, could not be done without volunteer assistance. These volunteers continue to find that there are very many items the PMI has, that are not listed for any other library.

PRAHRAN TECH: Still Alive

When students from the 1940s and 1950s meet each year for their annual get together, many a story about the 'good old days' are reminist [sic]. In recent times up to 70 ex-students meet, which began in 2008 with just 6 couples having lunch together and the most asked question was 'I wonder what happened to ...?' This then grew by making contact with those few whose whereabouts were still known, but finding many of the female students was more difficult with changes of names.

Many stories were shared as a number of attendees had not seen each other since finishing school 60 years ago.

In those days, although the school catered for boys and girls, it was a far cry from being co-ed as we know it today. The girls were housed in the High Street building and the boys in the St John Street building, destinctly separated by the cobble

stone laneway, known as the 'dunny lane' where the boys assembled to go into class. The girls assembled on the tennis court on the corner of St John & Thomas Streets and marched to the High Street entrance to class. This area was used as the girls playground while the boys playground was a vacant block of land off Green Street behind the Eyelet factory.

Despite the antiquated conditions by today's standards, the school managed to produce some well known personalities, mostly in the sporting areas.

From the 1940s and 50s came the following:

Lindsay Gaze - Basketball player and coach ; three times Olympic player and Olympic coach ; coach of Melbourne Tigers for 35 years ; Member of the Australian Hall of Fame, Member of Sport Australia Hall of Fame ; 612 NBL games.

Mervyn Rose AM - Tennis ; Australian singles and doubles champion 1954 ; French singles, doubles and mixed doubles champion 1958 ; Wimbledon men's doubles and mixed doubles champion 195? ; US Championships men's doubles champion

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1952-53 ; Australian and international Tennis Hall of Fame Member.

Don Tregonning - Tennis ; mostly an Australian men's doubles player 1948-1953 Australian Open partnering Mervyn Rose, Phil Brophy and David Yates ; Member of the Tennis Coaches Australia - Victoria Hall of Fame 2005.

Russell Pratt - Tennis ; Life Member of Tennis Seniors Victoria ; Junior state representative ; long time tennis coach.

Bob McKenzie - Football ; VFL champion Melbourne Football Club 1948-1955 ; 125 games, 254 goals, premiership player 1948 and 1955 ; Victorian representative nine times.

Frank 'Bluey' Adams - Football ; Melbourne Football Club

Kevin Sheedy & Kevin Bartlett - Football ; Both of these Richmond players followed in the 1960s

Dean Chapman - Football ; St Kilda Football Club 1948-51 ; Captain Prahran Tech team 1946.

Bill Seewittz - Boxing ; Australian Lightweight Amateur Champion ; Representative Commonwealth Games Auckland 1950.

Bob Todd - Judo ; Australian Open Champion 1960 ; President of the Judo Federation of Australia 1985 ; Life Member Judo Victoria ; 7th Dan?? International Judo Federation.

Kevin Todd - Judo ; topgrade competitor with brother Bob ; Represented Victoria.

Maurie Quincey - Motorbike Racing ; eight times Australian Motorcycle Champion ; Captain of Australian team competing on the Isle of Man T.T. (??) event 1955 ; Drove racing cars at Sandown and Phillip Island 1970.

Cedric Meers - Ballroom Dancing ; Australian Modern Professional Champion 1966 ; Latin Champion 1964 ; Adjudicator 2011 Australian Dancesport Championships.

Bob Flanagan - Football umpire ; Senior VFL list 11 years ; VFA 15 years.

Harry Marks - Football umpire ; Victorian

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Amateur Football Association.

Len King - Cricket umpire ; Australian Test Cricket 1989-1993.

Kevin Parker - Squash ; Good tennis player at school, switched to squash and represented Victoria in championships ; Migrated to Canada in 1960s and represented that country, winning four British Open championships in the late 1970s.

Barry Gaze - Football ; Member of combined VFL/VFA side to play a demonstration match at the MCG 1956 Olympic Games.

Laurie Allen - Musician ; Starting as a student at the Victorian Banjo Club, moved on to guitar playing before he left school ; Later formed the duo pop act 'Bobby & Laurie'.

Joan Carden AO OBE - Singer ; famous Australian opera singer ; sometimes referred to as 'the other Joan' (a reference to Dame Joan Sutherland and Dame Joan Hammond) ; Principal Soprano with Opera Australia for 32 years.

Ruth Marriott - Surfer ; State Champion 1958 ; Victorian representative at World Championships at Manley(??).

Nick Sofarnes - Architect ; Architect to the Sultan of Bruni.

Tony Moore - Surgeon.

Apologies again for the imbalance of gender due to marriage name changes.

A coincidental circumstance of the time were two students, both at the same school, in the same year and in the same class. Due to the alphabetical seating they sat in the same desk. Thomas Edward Stuart and Thomas Edward Albert Stewart (different spelling) both lived at house number 38 (Victoria & Spring Streets, Prahran).

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ancestry library edition Updates

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On Sunday 9 June, Christine and Ursula attended a meeting of VicGUM (the computers special interest group of the Genealogical Society of Victoria) held at the Mount Waverley Community Centre. The speaker was Brad Argent (Australian & New Zealand Content Director for Ancestry.com) and he presented information on some of **Ancestry Library Edition** updates over the previous year and plans for the year ahead.

Ancestry.com was launched in 2006 and now contains around 11 billion records in around 30,000 databases. In Australia there are five Ancestry staff members.

Databases added recently include the following:

• UK Engineers - Civil Engineer Records (1820-1930) and Mechanical Engineer Records (1847-1930)

• Parish records for Surry, Wiltshire, Dorset, Lancashire

• NSW Industrial Schools 1867-1925 - includes the names of children, where they were found, their birth dates and information about their parents.

• UK Outward Passengers 1890-1960 - including the first round of Ten Pound Poms. The leaving records of around 240,000 Australian immigrants.

Rockingham School (WA) Index

• Commonwealth War Graves - WWI and WWII - giving a soldier's name, registration number, age, parents, spouse, grave location.

• NSW Police Gazettes 1854-1930 - including name, birth year, event, location.



AUSTRALIAN HISTORY

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The stalking of Julia Gillard / Kerry-Anne Walsh

This is the story about one of the most extraordinary episodes in recent Australian political history. It focuses on Team Rudd and the media's treatment of their slow-death campaign of destabilisation, with its disastrous effect on Gillard and the government's functioning. This account is about a politician who was never given a fair go; not in the media, not by Rudd, not by some in caucus. Never has a politician been so assiduously stalked. Cast as a political liar and policy charlatan, she was also mercilessly and relentlessly lampooned for her hair, clothes, accent, her arse, even the way she walks and talks. Rudd, on the other hand, could barely do any wrong. His antics were afforded benign, unquestioning prime-time media coverage.

MILITARY HISTORY

Lancaster men: the Aussie heroes of Bomber Command / Peter Rees

Over 10,000 Australians served with Bomber Command, a highly trained band of elite flyers who undertook some of the most dangerous operations of World War II. They flew mission after mission over France and Germany knowing that the odds were against them. Stretched to breaking point, nearly 3500 died in the air. Their bravery in extreme circumstances has barely been recognised. Peter Rees traces the extraordinary achievements of these young aviators. He tells their hair-raising stories of battle action and life on the ground. And he recounts how, when they returned to Australia, they were greeted as Jap dodgers and accused of 'hiding in England while we were doing it tough'.

Kitty's war: the remarkable wartime experiences of Kit McNaughton / Janet Butler

Kitty's War is based upon the previously unpublished diaries of Great War army nurse Sister Kit McNaughton who grew up in Little River, Victoria. Kit and historian Janet Butler grew up in the same part of regional Victoria, except many decades apart. The idea of this young nurse setting out in July 1915 on a journey that would take her across the world and into the First World War took hold of Janet Butler and inspired her to research and share Kit's story. This decisive and dryly humorous woman embarked upon the troopship Orsova in 1915. Kit's absorbing diary follows her journey through war from Egypt, where she cared for the Gallipoli wounded, to Lemnos Island off the coast of the Dardanelles and then on to France and the Somme. Kit finished active service as Australia's first plastic surgery nurse, assisting medical pioneers in this field as they repaired the shattered faces of Australian soldiers. Through Kit's diary and Janet butler's thoughtful narration, we see the war through the eyes of a young Australian nurse as she is transformed by what she witnesses. This is an intimate and rare story of one woman's remarkable experience of war.

Leigh Matthews : my life - accept the challenge / Leigh Matthews

A true football legend, this is a hugely long awaited autobiography told with Leigh's customary steel, wry humour and no-holds barred honesty. Life and lessons from the world of Australian Rules Football as told by an icon of the sport, Leigh Matthews.
